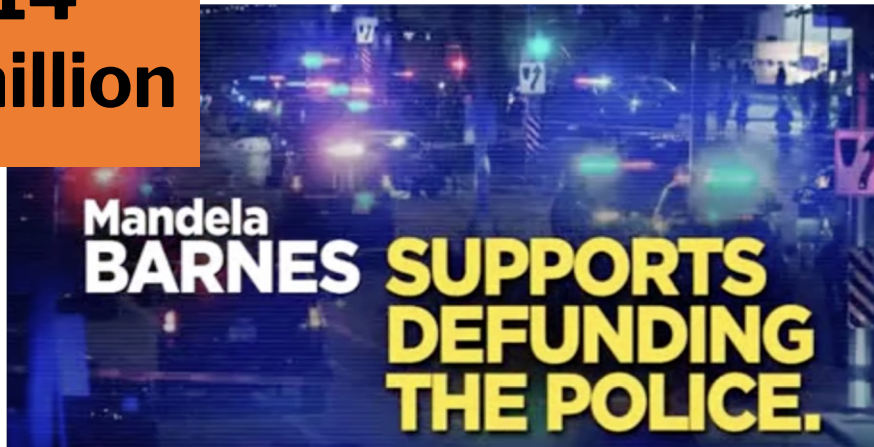

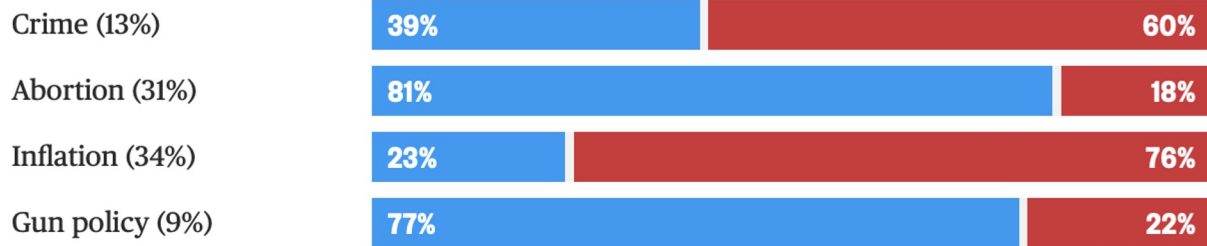

THE BIG TAKEAWAY FROM WISCONSIN POLLING:

As fear-based rhetoric and political attacks about crime and immigration are on the rise, Wisconsin electeds have an opportunity to own a message that is not only good policy, but good politics, resonating with Wisconsin voters across the board, but especially swing/Independent voters:

“I am serious about safety, stability, and security.”

METHODOLOGY

Global Strategy Group conducted a survey of **800 likely voters in Wisconsin** between July 8 and July 14, 2024.

An oversample of an additional 250 interviews were conducted among Milwaukee County voters for a total of 359 interviews among Milwaukee voters and a total of 1,050 interviews overall.

The margin of error at the 95% confidence level for is +/- 3.5%.

The margin of error at the 95% confidence level for the split sample is +/- 5.2%.

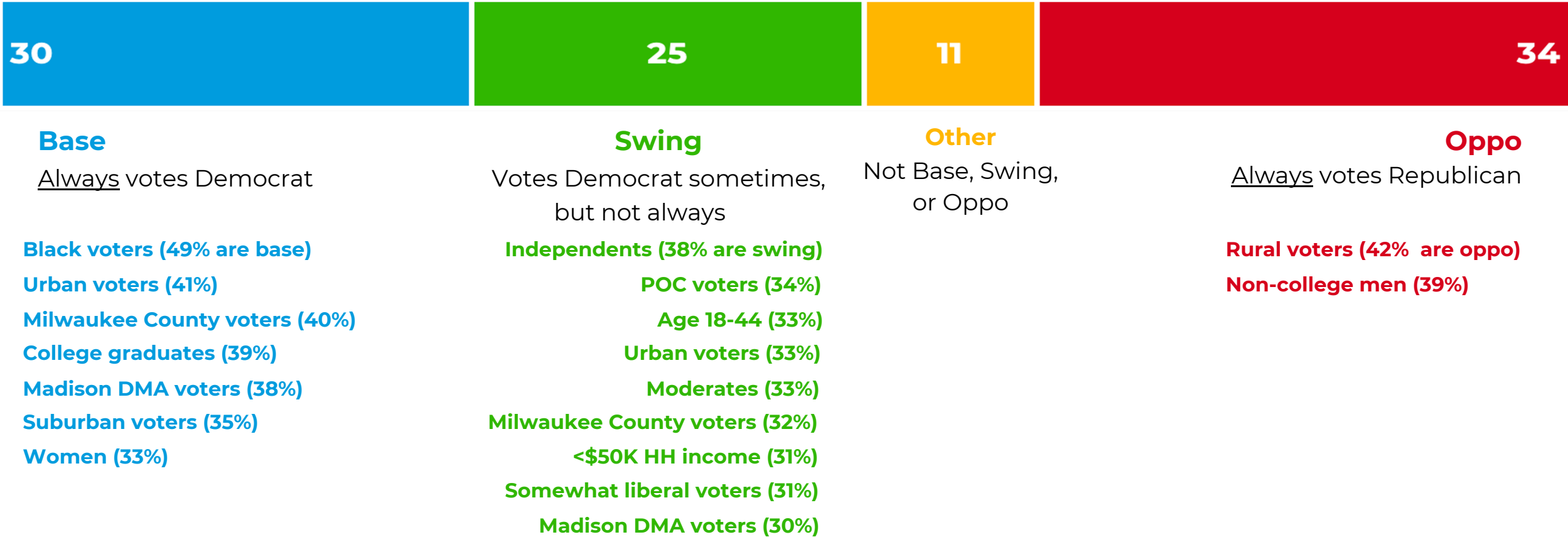

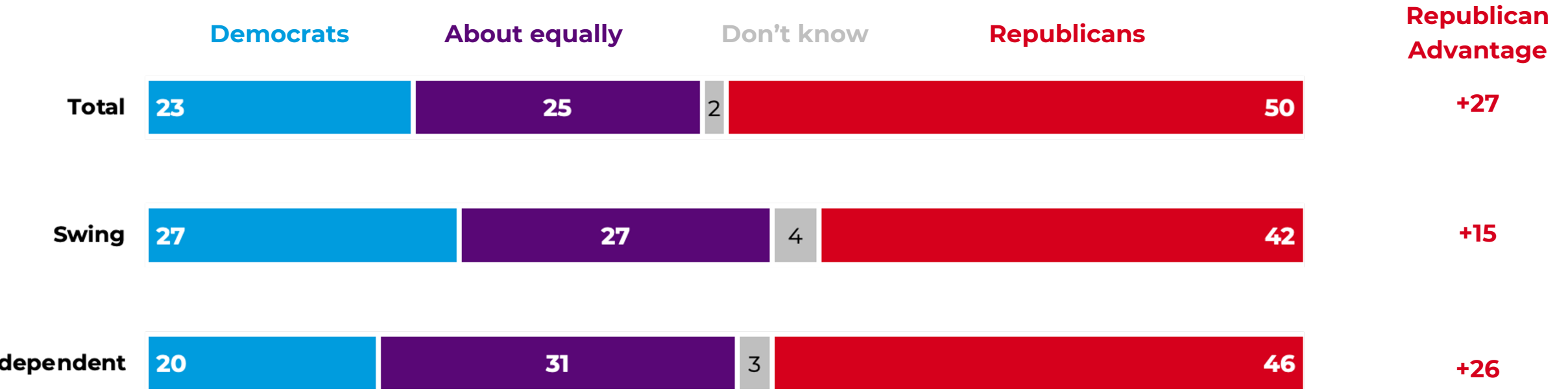


TAKEAWAY # 1.

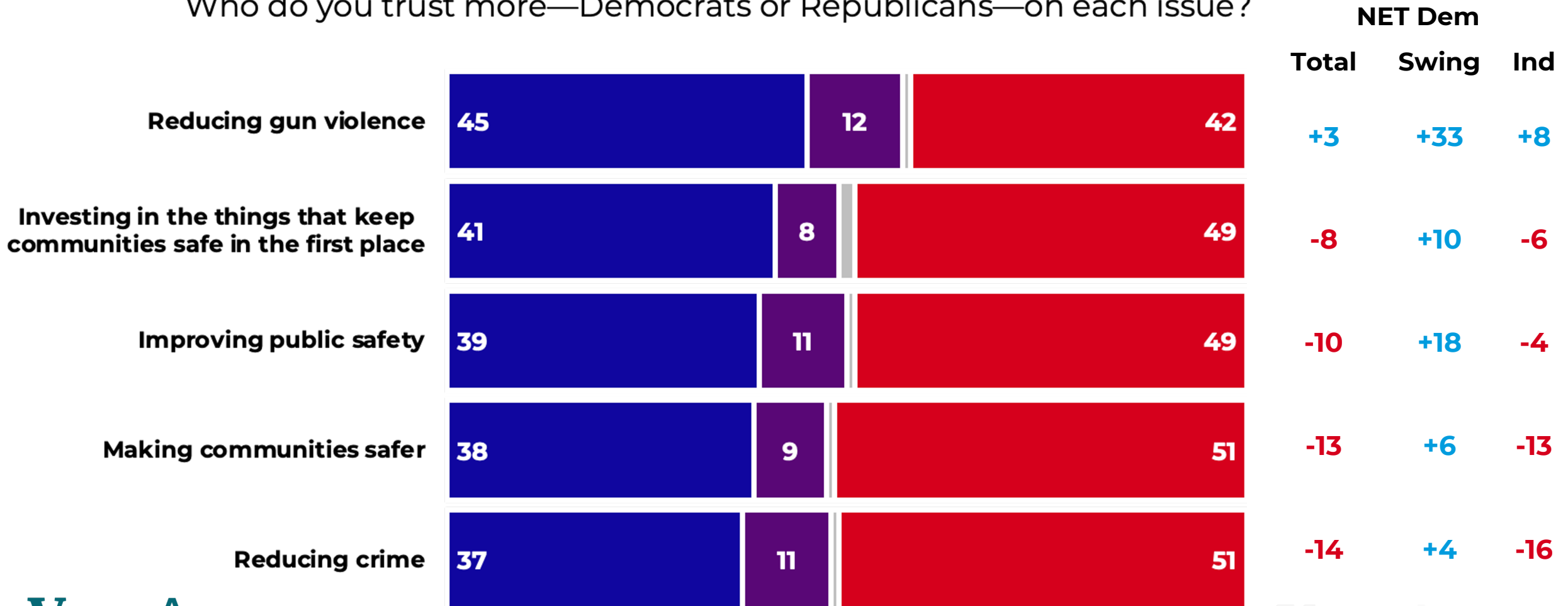
WI REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES ARE CURRENTLY DOMINATING THE DEBATE ON CRIME AND SAFETY

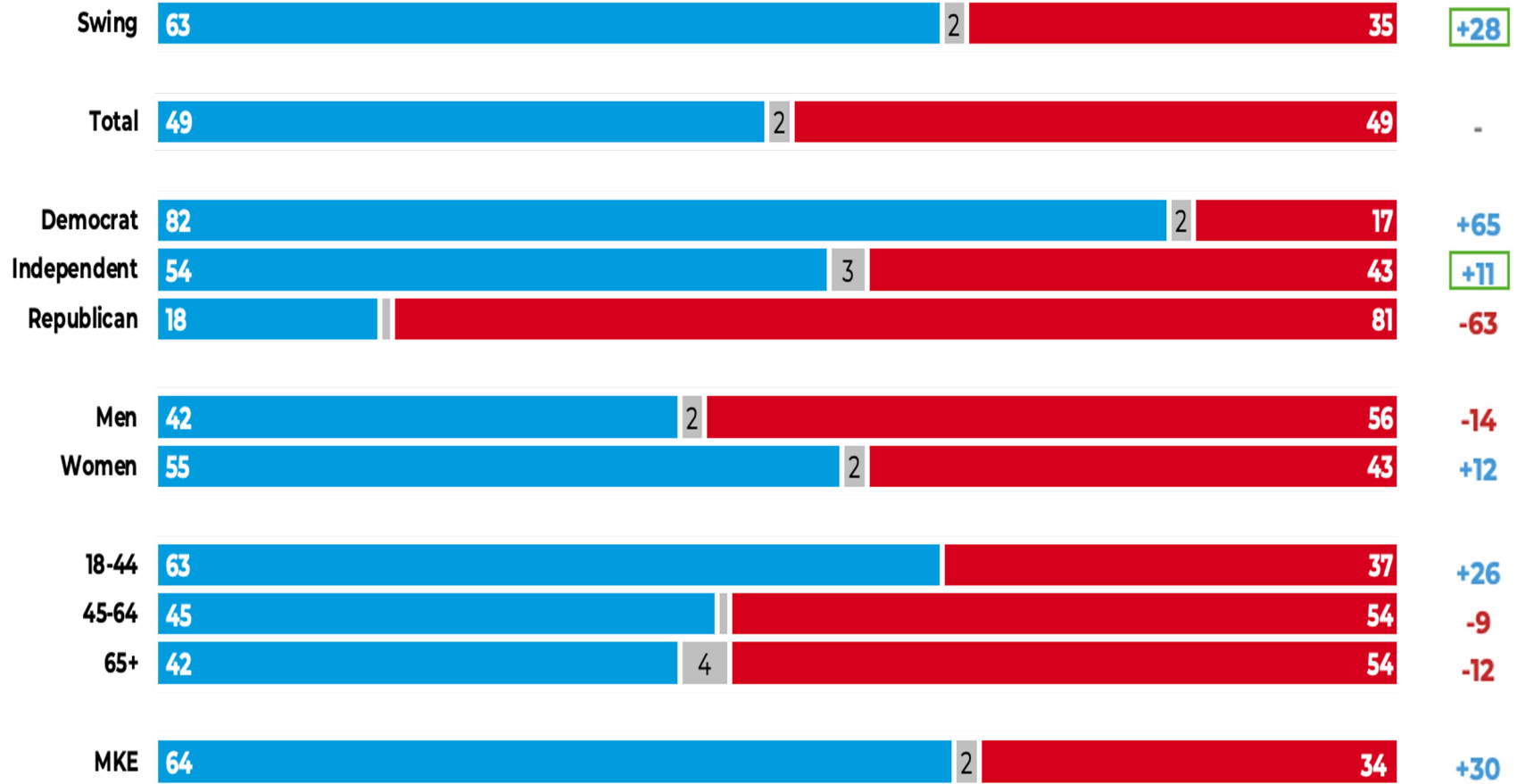
Wisconsin voters—including swing voters and even independent voters—favor a “serious about safety” message over a “tough-on-crime” one.

SWING VOTERS IN WI PREFER A “SERIOUS” APPROACH OVER MORE “TOUGH ON CRIME”

[SERIOUS ABOUT SAFETY] Fully funding things to create safe communities and improve people’s quality of life, like good schools, a living wage, affordable housing, and do more to prevent crime by increasing treatment for mental health and drug addiction and getting illegal guns off the street.

[TOUGH ON CRIME] Doing more to get tough on crime, like having tougher sentences for people convicted of violent crimes, maintaining strong bail laws to keep potentially dangerous people in jail, and providing police more support and resources.

Which do you believe would be more effective at reducing crime in Wisconsin?

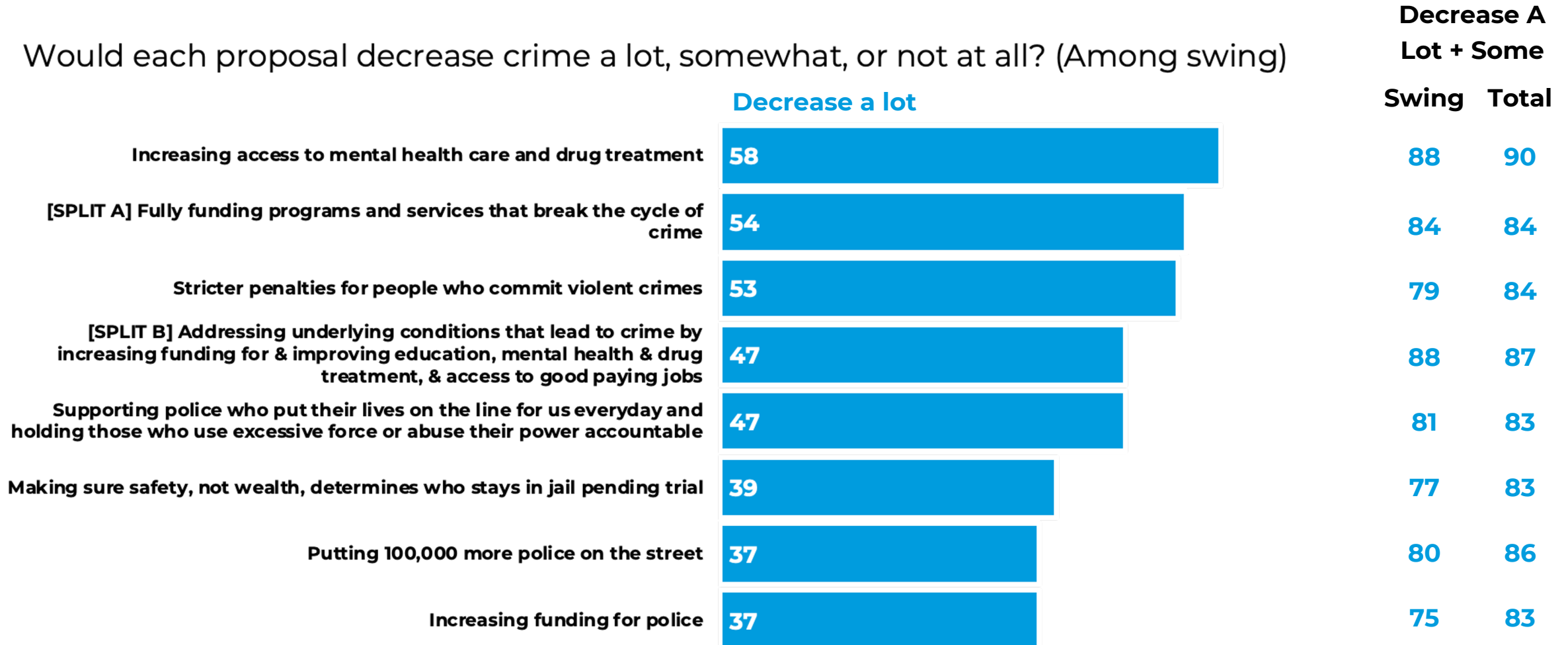

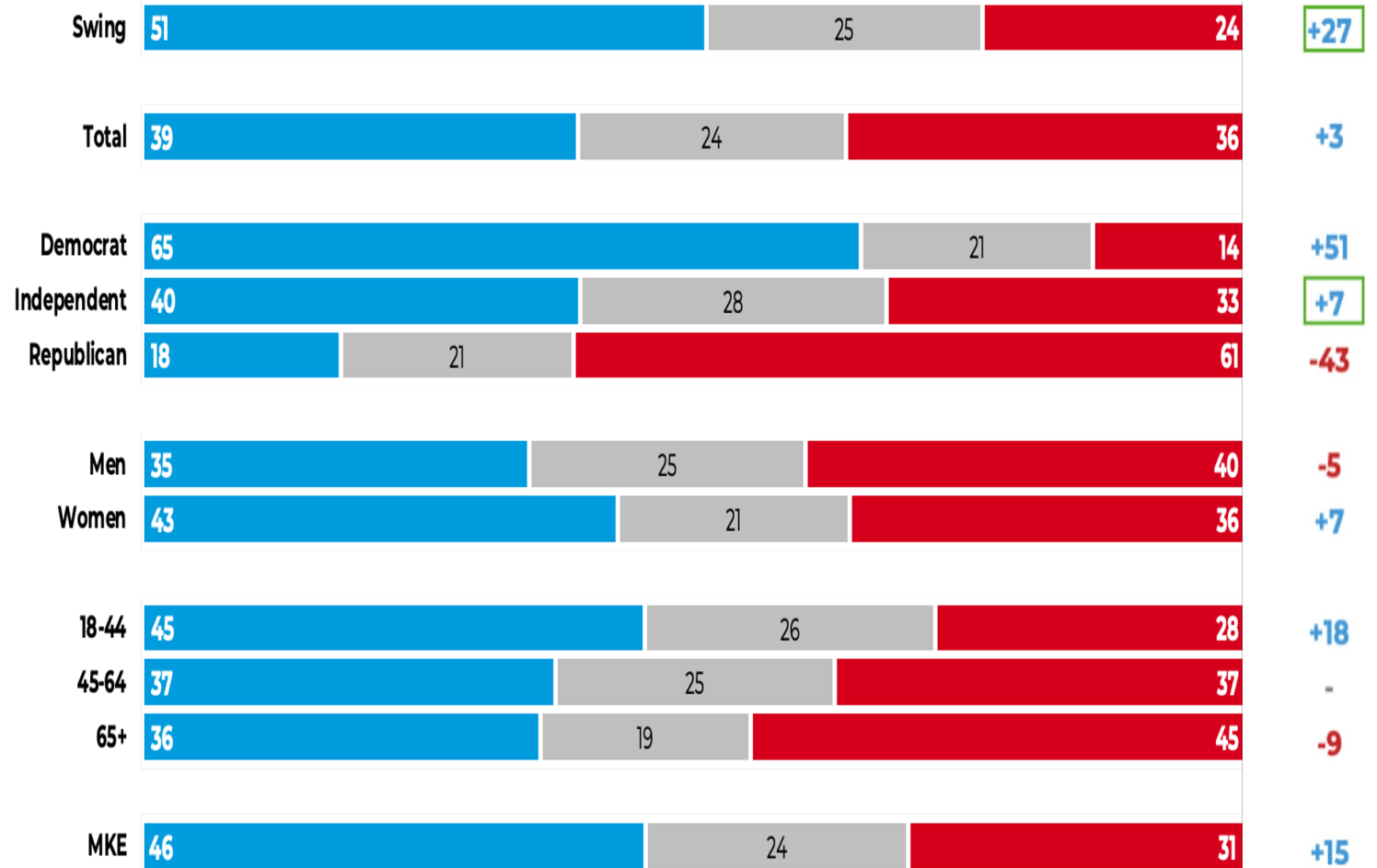
**Accountability matters, but
Wisconsinites want more than
a punishment-only approach.**

WISCONSINIANS KNOW THAT ACCOUNTABILITY DOES NOT SIMPLY MEAN MORE PUNISHMENT

[SAFETY AND JUSTICE] Some say crime is out of control, and to make communities safe, people who break the law must be held accountable. This means seeing the harm they've done, accepting the consequences, learning from mistakes, and changing their behavior. Harsh punishment and long sentences alone lead to more violence. We need to provide people with programs that work to turn their lives around and prevent future crime.

[DO THE CRIME, DO THE TIME] Others say crime is out of control, and we need to make sure that people who break the law are held accountable by enforcing strict punishments. If you do the crime, you should do the time and that means serving the full sentence. Offenders shouldn't be able to get out of jail or prison early simply because they complete programs or have a good track record behind bars.

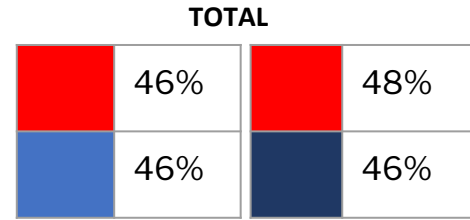
Even when facing attacks, leaning into a “serious about safety” message helps inoculate against “soft on crime” or “migrant crime” attacks.

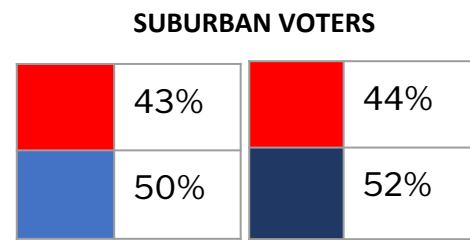
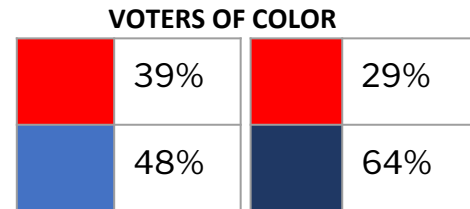
GOP ATTACK: I am tackling crime and protecting law-abiding Wisconsinites. I will stop the revolving door for criminals, make sure criminals serve their full sentence and force prosecutors to prosecute all cases, big and small. I will "back the Blue" by increasing police funding and putting more officers on the streets. Unlike Democrats, who support "soft on crime" policies like eliminating cash bail and releasing violent criminals from prison early, I will restore law and order to stop crime.

DEM “SMART ON CRIME”: I will restore law and order to Wisconsin’s communities. Addressing crime means getting illegal guns off the street, improving police response times and solving serious crime. I will add more funding for police, crack down on violent criminals, and go after the worst offenders by imposing stricter sentences. Unlike Republicans, who talk a big game but oppose common-sense gun safety laws, I know what works to be both tough and smart on crime.

DEM “SERIOUS ABOUT SAFETY”: I will make Wisconsin’s communities safer and prevent crime before it happens by investing in schools, housing, and mental health and addiction programs. Addressing violent crime means getting illegal guns off the street, improving police response times, and solving serious crime. I support police who put their lives on the line but also hold them accountable for abuse. Unlike Republicans, who oppose programs that prevent crime and common-sense gun laws, I have solutions that work to make every neighborhood safe.

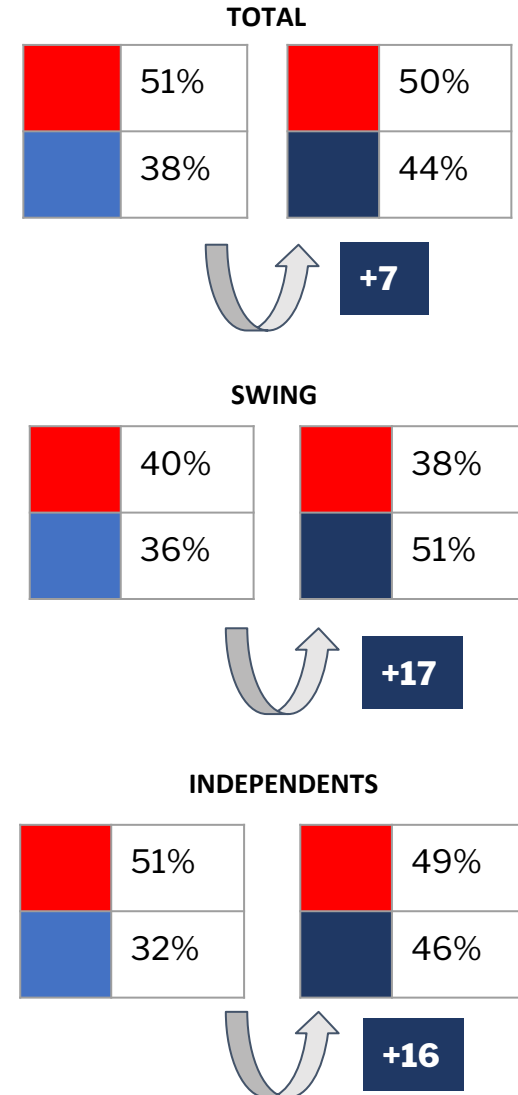

AGAINST “DEFUND,” BEING “SERIOUS” IS MORE EFFECTIVE THAN A “DEFUND” COUNTERATTACK

GOP ATTACK: The Left has allowed a culture built on hating the police to drive decisions surrounding law enforcement. The hostile climate for police has discouraged proactive police work. The Defund the Police movement is without a doubt one of the greatest dangers to public safety in our nation’s history, and Democrats are responsible for it.

DEM “TOUGH ON CRIME/JAN 6TH”: MAGA Republicans are pushing a soft on crime agenda to defund the police, pardon violent insurrectionists, and align with convicted criminals. I support increasing funding for our police departments, while Republicans side with violent January 6th insurrectionists and a convicted felon over law enforcement.

DEM “SERIOUS ABOUT SAFETY”: I’m not about scare tactics or slogans, and I’m not afraid to have an honest conversation. We keep expecting police to solve every social problem, from kids skipping school, to mental illness, to homelessness, and to gun violence. No one profession can do that. We’re spending \$115 billion a year and putting too much on police departments. It’s time to try out some promising new solutions to lift the burden. It’s time for support and change, not blame.

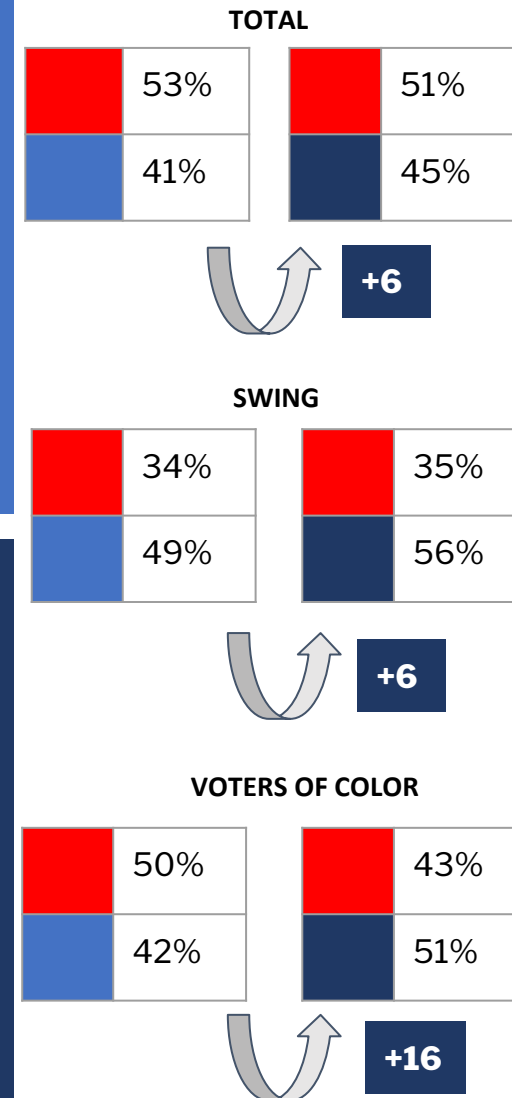


WHEN FACING “MIGRANT CRIME WAVE” ATTACKS, A “SERIOUS” RESPONSE OUTPERFORMS A “TOUGH” ONE

GOP ATTACK: Millions of illegal immigrants are flooding the country - including known criminals, sex traffickers, drug traffickers, and gang members - bringing violent crime and drugs across the border and into our communities. Democrats’ open borders, sanctuary city policies, and catch and release policies have led to a migrant crime wave. And Democrats are more worried about feeding and clothing illegals, while the rest of us struggle. I will secure our borders, end the chaos in our cities, and focus on Americans first.

DEM “TOUGH”: The influx of asylum seekers is overwhelming places like New York and Chicago. New migrants are taking up resources and money our states can’t afford. We don’t have the infrastructure to deal with them. We need urgent help from community partners and government leaders to make sure these families have the tools to work and contribute to our communities. We also need the federal government to take action now to increase border security and stop the influx of migrants.

DEM “SERIOUS”: We all deserve safety and security. I’m focused on solutions, not scare tactics. Let’s secure our border by investing in new technology to detect fentanyl and drugs and prevent them from reaching our communities. Let’s make sure there’s a pathway to citizenship for families who’ve been here for years. Here at home, let’s fully fund things proven to improve everyone’s quality of life, like good schools, good paying jobs, health care, and affordable housing. Let’s make life safer, more stable, and secure for all of us.

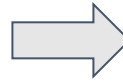
