

Election results: New York Governor Last updated Jan. 12, 2023, 12:44 p.m. EST Leading/Won Dems GOP






NYC voters will stay home, or veer right, if candidates don't offer a contrasting vision for safety and justice





Lesson 1.

The problem isn't that "tough on crime" wins. It's that voters aren't hearing an alternative.

Democrats avoided talking about bail reform after passing it—if they had spoken up, we'd be in a different position

"Bail reform in New York ended cash bail for low-level misdemeanors and nonviolent felonies. Before bail reform, our court system criminalized poverty, creating a system where the wealthy were free to go because they could afford to pay bail and gain release, but if you were poor you would go to jail. There is a lot of misinformation about how bail reform works in New York. Many judges, police officers, prosecutors, and public defenders continue to support the bail reform laws because they know that judges can and do still set bail and detain people facing serious and violent charges, and those who commit crime are still held accountable."

Lesson 2.

Flip the script from crime to safety by owning an affirmative message of "serious about safety."

Responding to fearmongering with a "serious about safety" message outperforms "tough on crime"

GOP ATTACK:

I will make hard-working, lawabiding citizens the priority, and end the revolving door that releases violent criminals right back onto the very streets they committed their crimes on. I will make prosecutors do their jobs and enforce all the laws. I will fund the police and provide resources to rebuild the ranks of departments who have lost officers due to a lack of support and low morale. I will stand up to Democrats, who have allowed repeat criminals out of jail through bail reform and want to defund the police, and I will restore law and order in New York.

TOUGH ON CRIME RESPONSE:

I am committed to keeping communities safe and reducing crime. I support giving police more funding so there are more police on the ground and in communities. I want to give police and prosecutors the tools to solve and prosecute homicides and other violent crimes. I support speedy processing of rape kits to help solve rape cases, and enforcing laws to protect women from domestic abusers. I will make sure repeat violent offenders and people committing crimes with guns do not get early release from prison. I will support strict penalties for convicted drug dealers to stop the flow of drugs into our communities.








What it means in practice to center accountability

"Serious about safety" counters the law-andorder fearmongering about the border, crime, and policing.



On immigration, voters want a message of "safety, security, and stability"

GOP ATTACK:

Millions of illegal immigrants are flooding the country – including known criminals, sex traffickers, and gang members – bringing violent crime and drugs across the border and into our communities. Democrats' open borders, sanctuary city policies, and catch and release policies have led to a migrant crime wave. And Democrats are more worried about feeding and clothing illegals, while the rest of us struggle. I will secure our borders, end the chaos in our cities, and focus on Americans first.

DEMOCRAT "SAFETY, STABILITY, SECURITY":

We all deserve safety and security. I'm focused on solutions, not scare tactics. Let's secure our border by investing in new technology to detect fentanyl and drugs and prevent them from reaching our communities. Here at home, let's fully fund things proven to improve everyone's quality of life, like good schools, good paying jobs, health care, and affordable housing. 

On retail theft, respond to attacks with solutions, not fact checking

GOP ATTACK:

We can thank woke prosecutors for letting American cities spiral out of control. People are scared to go into stores because of theft and looting. Hardworking employees and business owners are traumatized and scared to go to work. Organized retail crime is just happening brazenly. Evil is spreading across the country, with thieves taking whatever they want and prosecutors aren't doing a thing about it. In fact, woke prosecutors are against any charges or prosecutions for theft. There are no consequences and that's why criminals are so open, brazen, and violent with stealing. We've got to get tougher on crime. I'll start by making sure every thief is punished to the full extent of the law.

RESPONSE FOCUSED ON FACT CHECKING:

My opponent wants to use scare tactics to rile people up to win votes. Look at the data. There is not a retail theft epidemic. We should do more to stop theft, but let's tell the truth about the problem and solutions. I will work with police to reduce theft so that our stores don't have to lock up basics like toothpaste and shampoo. On policing, a support and accountability message wins, particularly when supported by nonpartisan messengers

CANDIDATE A ATTACK:

My opponent supports the radical left and defunding the police. Crime is at an all-time high, but the other candidate constantly criticizes the police, voices support for policies that stop the police from doing their jobs, and wants to allow repeat criminals out of jail through so-called "bail reform." The other candidate is opposed by police unions because they want to take away resources from our brave officers and leave them defenseless in the line of duty. Our cities, like New York, are under siege by criminals because of anti-police candidates.

CANDIDATE B "SUPPORT AND ACCOUNTABILITY":

We deserve real solutions to keep our communities safe. We are pouring billions of dollars into a public safety system that isn't working. We need to get serious about safety with a new approach. We can support the police to do the difficult jobs we ask them to do, and also hold them accountable when they break the law. We can reduce crime by investing in community violence prevention, youth employment, mental health and drug treatment, and affordable housing, and by focusing police resources on the most serious cases.
